#### 16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM – VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND GIRLS PARTNERSHIP

The 16 Days of Action is an annual international campaign that calls for the elimination of all forms of violence against women and girls. It runs from 25 November (UN International Day of Elimination of Violence against Women) to 10 December (International Human Rights Day).

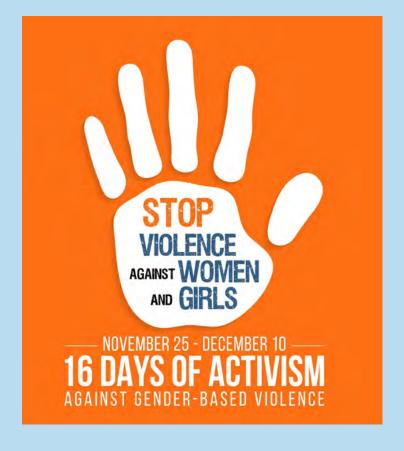
The campaign is a key focus of awareness raising for the East Dunbartonshire Violence against Women and Girls Partnership. Plans are underway for this year's events and awareness opportunities; these include:-

- Lighting up a number of Council buildings

   Kirkintilloch, Bishopbriggs and Bearsden
   Community Hubs and Milngavie Town
   Hall in orange on the first day of the campaign to raise awareness of the
   Days campaign and to encourage residents to learn more about the efforts being made to eliminate gender-based violence.
- Learning events for practitioners East Dunbartonshire Women's Aid will raise awareness of domestic abuse as well as highlighting the impact of domestic abuse on children and young people.
  - An awareness session will also be held by the Trafficking Awareness Raising Alliance (TARA) to raise awareness of human trafficking, specifically focussing on women who are recovered in Scotland as a result of commercial sexual exploitation.
- Awareness events for practitioners and members of our community including two separate events in Kirkintilloch Town Hall. One will focus on post-separation abuse and the other will have a focus on Violence against Women and Girls in the Deaf and Deafblind community.

In addition, there will be awareness raising in schools, libraries and the Regent Shopping Centre in Kirkintilloch.

#### SAFE AND TOGETHER

The Safe and Together Model is a perpetrator pattern based, child-centred and survivor - strength based approach to domestic abuse. The model, which originated in the US, is now in practice in over 16 local authorities in Scotland and aims to improve how practitioners assess, document, case plan and improve outcomes for survivors and their children.

The model encourages a systematic and cultural shift in how we approach domestic abuse through providing a framework for partnering with survivors and intervening with perpetrators in order to enhance the safety and wellbeing of children.

The training not only provides an enhanced understanding of the dynamics of domestic abuse, it links how children are impacted and harmed beyond witnessing violence and how survivors will often demonstrate parental strengths to safeguard their children in the face of domestic abuse.

In East Dunbartonshire we are working to embed the approach across the whole authority. One way to support us to do this is by attending the training relevant to your role. If you're not sure where to start, then the 1-hour briefing would be perfect. More details can be found in our Joint Learning and Development training calendar. #### **Prevention**

Since our Prevention Worker joined in June, we've been working closely with schools to strengthen support for young people. We're currently delivering misogyny workshops for S5 and S6 students, with sessions scheduled across four schools.

Alongside this, we're developing further workshops on themes including healthy and unhealthy relationships, online misogyny, healthy friendships, and teenage relationship abuse. These will be delivered across different year groups, helping young people to recognise red flags in relationships and friendships, think critically about the messages they see on social media, and understand how harmful behaviours can develop in teenage relationships.

As part of the 16 Days of Activism, we're also partnering with the Rosie Project to deliver a staff workshop on misogyny, supporting schools to address these issues with confidence.



### SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE COORDINATION SERVICE (SARCS)

SARCS is a dedicated NHS Scotland service offering healthcare and support to people in the days after a rape or sexual assault, even if they aren't ready or are unsure about reporting to the police.

Anyone aged 16 or over can self-refer to SARCS by calling the dedicated 24/7 national telephone service within seven days of a rape or sexual assault.

Across Scotland, SARCS teams provide immediate healthcare and wellbeing support, including forensic medical examinations when appropriate. Forensic evidence can be kept for up to 26 months should someone decide to report to police later.
